
BIGNEWS AT BUTTONWILLOW FOR 2021

After six years in the making, an additional 2.5 mile track on 185 acres of previously unused property, part of the Buttonwillow Raceway Park complex, will be opening in 2021. The new track, built to FIA grade 4 standards, will have a 50 foot wide front straight with the rest of the track being 40 feet wide. This is a standalone track, not connected to the current facility

Much of the facility, including a 9000 sq ft tower building and restaurant, which will include a race car display, is funded by a \$500,000 donation by Cal Club Region SCCA members Dick and Kay Young.

Other features will include restrooms with showers, garages, and 29,000 square feet of shaded cover for race car parking.

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

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New School vs: Old School - EFI or Carbs

It's 2021, maybe time to retire that carburetor and your 6 mpg performance,. No carburetors have been on production cars since about 1990 and now fuel injection is an affordable easy to install option that brings your hot rod into this century.



I've heard enough "if it's not steel, it's not real" and "old school cars never had injection" to realize that there may always be reactionary hot rodders, avoiding the future and the present. This is not to say that your flathead with 3-2's is not cool, but today, with so many cars using over the counter crate motors, a carb is an anachronism; a throwback to the pre internet, leaded 25 cent a gallon fuel, cross ply tire era.

We discussed this with Terry Henry at Raceprep (www. terryhenrysraceprep.com) in Bakersfield, who had just finished an Edelbrock Pro Flo 4 XT install on a crate motor 350 in a '32 coupe. Terry said "the install was pretty straight-

forward". The Edelbrock XT looks a lot like the Corvette LT-1 of the 90's; all the sensors, fuel rails, etc, come installed on the manifold. Wiring is simple, really just three wires. Only a couple of minor issues, which caused this easy install to drag on for a couple of days; the 90 mm throttle body needs a specific 4 1/2" air filter, only available from K&N and for some, the top radiator hose might need some modifying as will the throttle cable. We used the Edelbrock Fuel Sump, a neat self contained high pressure pump, fed by the original mechanical fuel pump. You could also use an inline or in tank high pressure pump. A return line to the tank is also necessary. Edelbrock offers push on fittings which Terry didn't like. Turns out the fuel sump use a -6 AN (9/16-24) thread, took a day to find. But all in all, for about \$2200, it was ready to roll; the car started tight up, driving it some smoothed everything out as the computer learned whatever it needed to know. You could also use either Edelbrock's tablet or smart phone app to tweak the system as you want.





There are a number of similar systems available from Holley and Fitech, all of which seem to have good reviews. Some are just throttle bodies that replace the carburetor, others are like the XT, direct port injection

And other options include a number of self tuning throttle body stack injection setups, from Borla Hilborn, Fasr and Inglese to name a few. Not in our budget, they all are in the \$5000 + range but cool looking.





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


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Big News at Buttonwillow For 2021

A Revolution in The Model A Ford Engine

Automotive engine design and analyses has changed dramatically and is vastly improved since the Ford Model A engine was designed and analyzed in 1927. Have you ever wondered why even the best rebuilt or highly modified Model A engine has a useful life that is just a small fraction of the useful life of a modern engine? This article will attempt to answer that question and present an engineering design study that demonstrates what can be accomplished by substituting four redesigned parts into a Model A engine. By substituting these four redesigned parts, a stock appearing Model A engine can have the reliability and longer life of a modern engine, and a hot-rodded engine will have a much higher probability of staying together. Readers of this article will also learn about modern engineering methodology, understand the reasoning behind engineering design decisions, and learn how a collection of sand cores can come together to form the cavities of a complex casting. For additional information, readers are encouraged to do Internet searches on

the words, phrases, and terminology used in this article. This article presents a summary of what has been accomplished. And lastly, this article has been written to determine if there is enough interest for this engineering study to continue and become real hardware. I apologize for the length of this article, but there is a vast amount of information to present.

DIFFERENCES BETWEEN MODEL A AND MODERN DESIGN PRACTICES

If compared to a modern four-cylinder engine design, the Model A engine differs and is deficient from modern design practices in several areas as itemized below:

A Model A engine has three main bearings compared to the five main bearings found in a modern engine.

A Model A engine has small diameter longer bearings compared to the large diameter shorter bearings found in a mod-

A Model A engine has poured babbitt bearings compared to the replaceable insert bearings in a modern engine.

A Model A engine has a gravity feed (mains) and dip (connecting rods) oil system compared to the full pressure oil

A Model A engine has a slinger type rear main seal compared to a radial lip rear main seal in a modern engine.

A Model A engine has no counterweights on the crankshaft compared to a fully counter-weighted crankshaft in a modern engine.

A Model A engine has a restricted intake port design compared to the better flowing de-sign found in a modern engine.

A Model A engine has no valve seats compared to the steel ring seats in a modern engine.


















GRANDPA'S LAST MODEL 'A' RIDE

If anyone has a question, concern, comment, suggestion, or wants to get on the email list for updates, please reply to model.a.engine@hotmail.com. We will add your email address to our mailing list for updates and do our best to address any questions that you may have.

There have been several inquiries regarding the status and schedule for the new Model A engine kit (Cylinder Block, Crankshaft, and Connecting Rods).

We expected to have parts near the end of January 2021, but are running about 4 weeks late.

We placed a production order near the end of October 2020 with a promised delivery date near the end of January 2021.

The delivery date and quantity of new Model A engine kits from China (Cylinder block, Crankshaft, and Connecting rods) are both being impacted by problems that we have no control over.



The engine factory in China is huge and it has multiple machining lines. They recently received an order for 10,000 Mitsubishi engines. These engines will be manufactured on a line that has multiple special machines in series that is a modern version of the machining line seen in movies from the Ford archives.

Since our order is small, it has lower priority and is being manufactured on a line using CNC machines. The good news is that the factory will maintain the same Quality Assurance standards whether the order is big or small. The bad news is that our requested quantity will not be met.

After the production order was placed in October 2020, there has been an energy shortage in China, the factory where the flywheels are being manufactured is completely shut down because of a new Covid outbreak, and there is a shortage of shipping containers.

I spoke with John Lampl today and the New Engine Kits being shipped to Australia/New Zealand, and Europe will be delivered to the container yard this week, and the New Engine Kits being shipped to the USA will be delivered to the container yard on February 9th.

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INNING EDGE #39

Hi everybody, I don't know about you, but as far as I'm concerned it's been another long cold winter. Luckily the wait is almost over and the new racing season is just around the corner. Hopefully we can all get vaccinated and get back to normalcy.

In this article I would like to talk about something I have ran across much more than normal in the last couple of months. That is cylinder heads actually being hurt rather than helped, even though it was done with the best of intentions. I'm sure there are very few of you that actually port your own heads, or have a buddy do it. If you or your buddy know exactly what you are doing, great but if you are not 100% sure please try to find access to a

Keep in mind that bigger isn't always better. You can generally pick up cfm with a bigger port but, air velocity is equally important. You don't want to go in and open the port if you don't see an increase in cfm. In certain instances it may be beneficial to change the contour of the port in a certain area. This can be influenced by cam profile, combustion chamber shape, engine rpm, etc.

Generally one of the things you can do to make the port more efficient without sacrificing velocity is to narrow the valve guide bosses. Under certain circumstances you may be able to actually shorten the guide.

Another reasonably safe modification is pocket porting. Do nothing other than smooth out the form in the bowl. This entails putting a smooth radius on the short turn side and blending out the bowl on the long side into a consistently smooth form. While doing this, blend the port carefully into the seat area. If doing anymore in this area you should check your work with a flow bench.

In general concerning the rest of the port, just get the excess lumps out from casting irregularities, blend in the sharp edges and smooth out the rough spots. If you want to enlarge the port make sure you incorporate the use of a flow bench. Also keep in mind that anything you do in one area of the port will affect air flow in other areas of the port.

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





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EMEMBERING THE HISTORY OF AMERICAN Saluting Mr. Hudson: Jack Carl America's Hudson Dealer

Many new car dealers love the brands they sell. But few, if any, continue to sell the brand once it's failed.

That wasn't true of Jack Carl Miller of Ypsilanti, Michigan. Miller was 82, and known for running the business his father started, Miller Motor Sales, long after the brand it sold, Hudson. "We talked about how Hudsons, Studebakers, Willys, and many other orphans were always overshadowed at car shows and parked in the back rows behind Mustangs, Corvettes, classic tri-5 Chevys, and others," Mason says on the show's website. "We finally did something about it in 1997 and held the first orphan show which featured Hudson"

its co-founder even as more names join the ranks of orphan brands, including Scion, Hummer, Saab, Pontiac, Oldsmobile, Mercury, Plymouth, AMC, Eagle, Sterling, Geo, Merkur, and many others.

Now, with the coming merger of Fiat Chrysler Automobiles and Groupe PSA to form Stellantis, it remains to be seen how many of the group's current brands - which will include Peugeot, Citroën, DS, Opel, Vauxhall, Alfa Romeo, Chrysler, Dodge, Fiat, Jeep, Lancia, Maserati and Ram - will become orphans. Given there have been more than 2,000 manufacturers of automobiles in the United States, the show will always have an ample supply of show cars.

Miller came about his love of cars having been born into


The show continues 24 years later, soldiering on without it. His father, Carl Miller, opened a Hudson dealership in 1927 in Ypsilanti in a building that first housed an automobile fender stamping company, before becoming an early Dodge dealer.

> Hudson was founded in 1909 by two Olds Motor Works veterans, Roy Chapin and Howard Coffin, and was financed by Joseph Hudson, the man behind Detroit's most successful department store and for whom the company was named.

> The Hudson Motor Car Co. proved successful, as did Miller, selling scores of Terraplanes, Super Sixes, Commodores, Big Boys and Pacemakers. The company's best year was 1929 with sales of 300,000 units, although the company remained profitable after World War II, particularly after fielding the Hudson Hornet and its famous step-down design. The car dominated the early days of NASCAR and was immortalized by Paul Newman as Doc Hudson in the 2006 Pixar film "Cars.'

> The typical Hudson owner was upper middle class; Morgan Freeman chauffeurs Jessica Tandy in a Hudson Commodore in the movie, "Driving Miss Daisy." But the company stumbled with the compact Hudson Jet. Dwindling funds, a sales war between Ford and Chevrolet, and the high cost of reworking the Hornet forced Hudson into a merger with Nash-Kelvinator in 1954 to form American Motors. Miller added a Rambler franchise as Hudsons became little more than an over-trimmed Nashes. The public wasn't fooled, derisively referring to them as "Hashes."

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FORD BRONCO 4400 RACE TRUCKS WILL TACKLE ULTRA4 OFF-ROAD SERIES

The original Ford Bronco was a successful off-road racer, and Ford wants the new model to follow in its tire tracks. On Monday, the Blue Oval unveiled three Bronco-badged race trucks that will compete in the Ultra4 series, starting with the legendary King of the Hammers rock-crawling competition, to be held Feb. 2-6 in Johnson Valley, California.

The Bronco 4400 trucks have nothing in common with the 2021 Ford Bronco beyond a name and some styling cues. They're purpose-built tube-frame trucks with long-travel suspension and custom-built four-wheel-drive systems. Ford didn't provide any powertrain details, but expect the 4400 race trucks to make more power than a stock Bronco.

Ford will field three vehicles, including one driven by drifting star Vaughn Gittin, Jr. The two others will be driven by King of the Hammers veterans, Loren Healy, who has won the event twice, and Jason Scherer, a three-time winner.

Held every February on public land in Johnson Valley, the King of the Hammers combines rock crawling with desert racing. So vehicles built to compete must be able to achieve high speeds for desert running, but still be able to drive up a rock face.



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Ford previously built the Bronco R race truck for the 2019 Baja 1000 using the basic platform and 2.7-liter twin-turbo V-6 from the upcoming stock Bronco, but the truck failed to finish due to mechanical issues. A Bronco Sport also scored a class win in the 2020 Rebelle Rally, a 10-day women's navigational rally held in California.


Ford also plans to unveil a new Bronco model at the King of the Hammers event on Feb. 3. Stay tuned.



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

Volkswagen Beach Bomb

Bruce Pascal, an avid Hot Wheels collector, was only 7 years old when these car toys hit the market in 1968.

"It's hard to explain the craze today, but Hot Wheels was huge. All of my friends were saving up to buy all the Hot Wheels they could," Pascal told Volkswagen in a recent

After a childhood full of racing his hot wheels, Pascal stored them away in a cigar box at his mother's house. But his love for classic cars continued into adulthood and 30 years later, in 1999, he came across this dust-covered cigar box.

"That excited feeling I had as a boy was rekindled instantly," said Pascal. "My friend offered to pay me \$200 for the cigar box. I declined and held onto them, but it was his offer that made me start researching the value of Hot Wheels and pursuing collections as an adult."

Eager to grow his rediscovered collection, Pascal reached out to other Hot Wheels collectors and took out ads in a newspaper. He even got his hands on a 1969 Mattel employee telephone book and called former workers to see if they wanted to sell any of their rare cars.

"He collected everything he could, including Hot Wheels memorabilia like blueprints, original drawings, sales brochures and wood models," Volkswagen said in its an-

His collection started to grow by the thousands, but he had his heart set on obtaining a very special and rare Hot Wheels – a pink Volkswagen Beach Bomb prototype.

When Volkswagen and Hot Wheels first collaborated to make the model, it had a narrow body and surfboards hanging out of the back window. It was unable to stay upright when it rolled, so Hot Wheels redesigned the model, making the sides more weighted and moving the surfboards to the sides of the vehicle."

These redesigned models made it to production and were sold with a sticker sheet of flowers to decorate the vehicle, epitomizing the 1970s 'flower power' era," said Volkswagen.

The original Beach Bomb prototypes were extremely rare to find since only employees had access to them.

"I already had heard about (the Beach Bomb) in purple, green, red, light blue and gold. I even heard about an unpainted model," said Pascal. "But pink was extremely hard to find. Most Hot Wheels models were marketed to young boys, who the brand assumed didn't want to play with pink."

Only two of these pink Beach Bomb prototypes are known to exist, which only made Pascal's desire to have one even stronger. He tracked down the owners, made his offers, and acquired both pink Beach Bombs.

Pascal sold one of the models to another collector but kept the one in the best condition for himself.

"I won't say how much I purchased it for," said Pascal, "but it is worth an estimated \$150,000 today."

You'll find Pascal's pink Volkswagen Beach Bomb, his most prized possession, displayed in a dark, Plexiglass case in his Hot Wheels museum in Maryland.

"I want other people to experience the Beach Bomb. I've found so much joy in learning about classic cars and Hot Wheels, and I hope I can spark some of that in other people. It's a treasure to find these rare models," Pascal said.

AMC dropped Hudson in 1957, although the Hornet America's Stock Car Tracks" in 2009 as well as establish what he name would be resurrected by AMC in 1970 as a replacement for the Rambler. Altogether, about 3.75 million Hudsons were sold during the company's 49-year run. The Millers' total was somewhat less, selling 1,969 cars from 1927 through 1958. After that, Miller sold more than 100 Hudsons, not bad for a car no longer produced. Even though AMC lacked faith in Hudson, Miller's faith endured. AMC wanted the Millers to build a new Rambler showroom, but they refused, and the dealership survived selling Hudsons and other used cars, and Hudson parts. Jack Carl Miller graduated Cleary College in Howell, Michigan in 1965 with a Bachelor of Business Administration before returning to the small family dealership.


He took over the business in 1973, after the death of his father. Two years later, he began restoring Hudsons, and became the source of Hudson parts or expertise for those restoring their rides. In 1995, Miller Motors was sold to local investors who formed the Ypsilanti Automotive Heritage Museum. Miller was hired as curator, a position he held until retiring in 2013.

Miller used his time to write a book, "Total Domination: The Story of the Fabulous Hudson Hornet's Amazing Success on

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






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
